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FAMU Medical Marijuana Education and Research Initiative Partners with n Bi-National Health Fair Saturday

Tallahassee, Fla. – Florida A&M University (FAMU) Medical Marijuana Education and Research Initiative (MMERI) invites the public to the Panhandle Area Educational Consortium's (PAEC) Bi-National Health Fair and Hispanic Heritage Celebration in Quincy on Saturday.

The health fair will be held from 9 a.m. to noon at 315 N. Key St., Quincy. The event is free and open to the public. It will include medical and dental exams, information booths, health screenings for diabetes and blood pressure and many other services. Mexican Consulate services will also be provided.

PAEC helps small school districts with limited resources to better serve children, teachers, and administrators. The organization serves 14 member districts, representing over 45,000 students, as well as many other non-member districts.

Maria Pouncey, Ed.D., administrator for the Panhandle Area Educational Consortium, said she appreciates the effort being made by MMERI to reach out to all of Florida's diverse minority communities.

"It is important for both English and Spanish speakers to know that they are included in the discussion," Pouncey said. "Our families are gratified that MMERI has consistently made the effort to understand, engage and include concerns that are particular to the LatinX community and as such, also impact the lives of all of Florida communities of color."

The MMERI was launched in response to the Florida Legislature's funding allocation to educate "minorities about marijuana for medical use and the impact of the unlawful use of marijuana on minority communities."

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
